From Our Head of School

Dear Friends of AJC,

The 2020-2021 school year was a year unlike any other---for all of us. Despite the extraordinary difficulties of the pandemic, teachers, students, and graduates alike rose to the challenge. Beginning with our four-week summer school in July, we did not miss one day of in-person schooling. For the first half of the year, and following CDC and VDH guidelines, we could only have boys one week and girls one week while those at home worked virtually. By January we were able to creatively bring back all the 8th graders in-person, and by March all the 4th and 5th graders as well.



It wasn't perfect, and it certainly wasn't always pretty, but by some measures this year may prove to be our most successful, i.e., resilient, yet as a School. Teachers and staff worked harder than ever. All of us balanced our own anxieties around Covid with the need to carry out our mission of working with students who are at greatest risk from the collateral damage of not being at school in-person. Throughout the year we prudently welcomed volunteer support, the after-school high school program with UP RVA continued, and we managed to weave into the core academic program a significant amount of extra-curriculars. The arrival of the vaccine in late winter brought palpable relief!

Graduates, whether in high school, college, the work force, or just plain struggling, faced disproportionate challenges as well. Happily, we had their backs, and the graduate support staff managed to stay in touch and continue to do extraordinary work. In the Fall, all but two of our 8th grade graduates headed off to independent schools, and eleven of the graduates from the AJC class of '17 headed off to college. Two graduates are employed at AJC. We had our first official alumni gathering as well, while the number and quality of connections and interactions with graduates continued to amaze us all. Our community of affection runs deep and is now twelve-years-long and counting.

With the help of a one-day certificate of occupancy, we held the 8th grade graduation in our new gymnasium. The new middle school building and gymnasium will be officially occupied in the Fall of 2021. What a thrill that will be for all of us!

On a sad note, Gordon Wallace, a founding leader, Board chair for the School's first eight years, and active board member and supporter until the spring of this year, passed away after a courageous battle with cancer. Friends and family came together to create an endowment in his honor and his name will grace the hall at the entrance to the new building.

Finally, our supporters rose to the occasion as well, as generous as ever, continuing to bet on us, and we once again surpassed our financial goal for the year. Thanks to all of you who continue to make AJC possible.





Building Hope

AJC initiated a plan in 2018 to expand our mission and reach, providing new opportunities for our students, and nearly doubling the number of students we serve. Our Building Hope campaign has three components:



Building Expansion (\$8 million)

- Build a middle school academic campus and an athletic center
- Create space to establish a K-3rd grade program
- Expand space for UP RVA and graduate support services to better guide students into and through high school, college, and career

Increased Operational Funds (\$3 million)

 Raise operating funds to cover increased annual expenses resulting from the building and program expansion

Establishment Of An Endowment (\$5 million)

 Create a reserve fund to ensure the long-term viability of the School



Through the generosity of many individuals, foundations, and corporations, by the end of the 2020-21 school year we reached \$15 million (in donations and multi-year pledges) of the \$16 million campaign goal. We hope to complete the campaign in the 2021-2022 fiscal year.

Our Friend and Advocate

Gordon was a principal founder and driving force behind the Anna Julia Cooper School (AJC). Gordon loved AJC and was instrumental in shaping every essential element of it.



In his unassuming yet soundly tenacious manner, he shepherded the School from its very beginning, and served as the Board Chair for the School's first eight years. He continued his service on the board until his passing in May 2021. He believed in the students and in the teachers and staff. Steady, hopeful, determined, optimistic, courageous, and kind--all these qualities in Gordon helped make AJC possible. The first floor of the new middle school building will be named in his honor, in recognition of both his impact on the School and of the affection and esteem the AJC community holds for him.

His family and friends have established an Endowment Fund at AJC in his memory.
